

in honor of the family. Building improvements are all in excellent repair, main stock barn is 60x40, with a silo 12 feet wide and 34 feet in height. The Farm's surface is generally level and the soil a gravelly loam. The Farm came into the possession of Mrs. Cross by will, and has remained in possession of the family from date of ownership of her grandfather Alonzo B. Turney, Turney Road being named in his honor. Mrs. Cross married Charles Cross, September 20, 1910, her maiden name being Ida M. Turney.

ENTERPRISE FARM is owned by FAIRCHILD S. COLBURN, Post Office Address Perry, O., three and one-half miles distant. It numbers 60 acres on the Lane Station Road, Stop 7. Painesville and Perry are the principal markets, located both on the steam railroad and electric railway at Lane Station. This Farm is devoted to general farming, dairying and fruit. Alfalfa is a special product which together with the dairy adds materially to the Farm's revenues. The Farm has a complete water system, also gas well from which all buildings are lighted. Building improvements are new and the entire Farm is under cultivation. It has a complete system of tile drainage, embracing 65,000 feet of tile. The Farm's surface is level, and its soil contains a black sand and clay loam with clay subsoil which is very rich and under a high state of cultivation. Mr. Colburn purchased this Farm in 1910, and has added many modern and costly improvements. He married Josephine Doncaster, of Leroy, March, 1913.

SPRINGWATER FARM is owned by ALFRED FEW, Post Office Address, Perry, Ohio. It contains 103 acres, located on the North Ridge Road. Painesville five and one-half miles and Perry Village two and one-half miles distant are its principal markets. The principal feature of this Farm's revenues is stock raising and dairying. In this department, there are 25 cows, graded Holsteins, and 15 head of young stock. The milk product averages about four cans per day. The soil products are those common to this section of the State. It is claimed that the water supply is hardly surpassed by any in this section and consists entirely of spring water which is supplied by a gasoline engine which pumps water to all buildings. The pressure is sufficiently great to force water 30 feet high. The name has been selected from the fine springs located on the Farm. Building improvements are in fine condition. The residence is new and is supplied with all modern conveniences. The Farm's surface is undulating and its soil a sand and black loam. Mr. Few purchased the Farm in 1888, where he has since resided. Acetylene gas is supplied to residence and barns.

ORCHARD VIEW is owned by KATE S. GARNER, and O. J. GARNER, post office address Perry, O., R. F. D., No. 2. It contains 44.28 acres on the Lane Road, three miles from Painesville and two from Perry Village. The soil products embrace oats, corn, rye, wheat, potatoes and hay. The average is four acres of rye, six of corn, six of oats, five of wheat and two of potatoes. Some fruit is cultivated and there are five acres in meadow, the remainder in pasture. Spring and well water is furnished in abundance for stock and buildings. Building improvements are in the best condition. The Farm's surface is level and the soil a clay and sand loam. This Farm has been in the family for about 50 years. Mrs. Garner married La Rue M. Garner, October 29, 1874, her husband died September 7, 1906. O. J. Garner married Myrtle M. Brinkman, February 22, 1898, their family consists of two children, Amber M. and Cecil L.

GOLDING HOMESTEAD owned by JOHN L. GOLDING, Post Office, Perry, Ohio. It contains 70 acres on the North Ridge Road, two miles from Perry. The Farm is devoted mostly to general soil products, special features being fruit and a small dairy of graded stock. The soil products embrace wheat, oats and onions. Its water supply is received from wells and springs. Building improvements are in fine condition, including a modern, farm residence, barns, etc. The surface of the Farm is slightly rolling, slightly inclined toward the lake. Mr. Golding purchased this Farm in 1883, where he has resided since this date and all improvements were made by him. He was married November 30, 1875, to Sophia H. Drummond, and to them were born ten children, six daughters and four sons, all living. William Golding is a dentist in Painesville. Two daughters are married, one resides at home, three are working in Cleveland. The other sons are farmers.

SUNNYSIDE is owned by ROBERT C. GOLDING, address Perry, Ohio. It contains 27 acres on the Narrows Road, in Perry Village. The Farm's specialty consists of the cultivation of fruit, embracing small fruits, strawberries, raspberries, etc. It is watered by never-failing wells and its building improvements consist of a pleasant home residence, with necessary barns and out buildings. The Farm's surface is level and its soil a gravel and clay loam. Mr. Golding purchased this property from Mrs. J. E. Childs, April, 1915. He was born on the North Ridge Road, on his father's farm, and farming has been his occupation from the time of his coming to his majority. He is considered a practical and successful farmer, and is active in the best interest of his Township.

FRUITDALE is owned by NELSON N. HARRISON, Post Office, Perry, O. It contains 15 acres, one-half mile from the Village of Perry, located on the Davis Rd., Township 11, Range 7. Fruit is its specialty and aside from the usual varieties of pears, apples, peaches, etc., grapes and berries are cultivated. Among the latter variety are strawberries, raspberries, currants, etc. Two acres are devoted to garden truck, which completes the Farm's revenues. Its water supply is received from the Township Ditch, and its name is derived from fruit culture. The Farm's soil is a sandy loam and thoroughly adapted to the cultivation of fruit. This little Farm was owned by the Call Estate, and thence the title passed to the heirs of Mrs. Thomas Thompson; from the latter to the present owner in 1912. Nelson N. Harrison is the present Secretary of Perry Village, having been elected in 1914. On April 18, 1898, he was married to Miss Eva

Farr, of Madison, and their family consists of four daughters. Mr. Harrison has always taken an active interest in matters pertaining to the best interests of his village and town.

HOME ACRES contains 54.80 acres, owned by MRS. SARAH HURLBURT, and CLYDE HULL. Their Post Office is Perry, Ohio. The Farm is located on the North Ridge Road, two and one-half miles from Perry Village, its nearest market. Its resources consist of general soil products, onions, garden truck, celery, corn and peaches, there being about 3,000 peach trees. The water supply is received from wells forced into the residence and barns by gasoline engine power. A natural gas well is also located on the Farm. The buildings are in excellent condition, barns up-to-date with cement flooring and the residence is modern in all conveniences. The Farm's surface is level, its soil a sandy loam and is considered very productive. The Farm came into the possession of Isaac S. Hurlbert, about 1870, and from him by deed to the present owners. Mr. Clyde Hull purchased his one-half of the Farm from John Hopkins in 1910. Mrs. Hurlbert was formerly Sarah Lockwood. Isaac Hurlbert was killed by being thrown from a buggy in 1908. He was considered one of the progressive, up-to-date farmers of this section and his death was mourned by the general neighborhood.

TWIN PINES FRUIT FARM is owned by EMMA JOINER, Post Office Perry, O., one and one-half miles distant. It numbers 32.90 acres, and is located near Perry Village, Township 11, Range 7. The Farm's special products consist of fruits and nursery stock; the fruit varieties include peaches, cherries, grapes and currants. Never-failing wells furnish an ample water supply and its name is derived from two pine trees in front of the residence. Building improvements are in the best of condition and embrace a modern farm residence, a barn and shops. Its surface is level and soil a gravelly loam. This Farm was formerly owned by the Huson Estate, from which it was purchased by H. P. Haskel and from him the title passed to Mr. and Mrs. Joiner in 1907. The Joiners came to Ashtabula, Ohio, in 1885, with their two children and settled in Perry where they have since resided. Mr. Joiner married Emma Adams, of Ashtabula, February 27, 1881, and to them were born four children, two of whom are living. Mr. Joiner has always taken an active interest in political matters affiliating with the Republican Party.

LANEHURST is owned by HOMER W. LITTLEFIELD, Post Office, Painesville, Ohio, three and one-half miles distant. It contains 40 acres on the Hale Road, one-half mile from the Electric Railway Station. It is devoted almost entirely to soil products common to this section, including corn, oats, wheat, rye and potatoes. About five acres of the place are in pasture and the remainder in meadow. The water supply is furnished from never-failing wells for buildings and stock. Its name is derived from location. Buildings are all in the best of repair and include a general barn 20x30, with cement floors, cattle barn 30x40, with an addition 16x30, also with cement flooring. The Farm's surface is generally level and its soil a sandy loam. Homer W. Littlefield purchased this Farm in 1865, and has resided here since such purchase, being one of the old settlers of Perry Township. He was married to Mary Ann Irvine, March 2, 1865. Mr. Littlefield is one of the practical farmers of this section.

CHESTNUT VALLEY FARM owned by EUGENE H. LAPHAM, Post Office Painesville, O., R. F. D., No. 1. It contains 23 acres on the Hale Road, three and one-half miles from Painesville. Soil products embrace corn, oats, etc. A creek and two wells furnish an ample water supply. Building improvements embrace a nine-room residence, modern in its conveniences and general barn 50x27. The residence is supplied with furnace heat and a pump is located in the pantry which furnishes a convenient water supply for residence. The Farm's surface is level and its soil a gravelly loam. Mr. Lapham purchased this Farm in 1902, where he has since resided. He married Nellie Wilson, November 9, 1884, and their family consists of four children, viz: Fred E., Lloyd A. Maude I. and Mabel I. Lloyd A. Lapham resides on the Farm. Fred E. resides in Painesville and is engaged in merchandising. Maude I. is engaged as a stenographer and Mabel married Mr. Tilton and their residence is Painesville, Ohio.

LONG MEADOW is owned by THOS. LANGSHAW, Post Office Perry, Ohio. It numbers 109.92 acres located on the Narrows Road, two miles from Perry Station, Lot 58, Township 11, Range 7. Its average products are as follows: 25 acres of corn, 18 of oats, 10 of apples and peaches, one acre of strawberries and the remaining acreage is in meadow and pasture. T. H. Langshaw, a son of Thomas Langshaw, owns and operates a portion of this Farm, containing about 46.2 acres. In addition to the industries above mentioned, there is a dairy, the product from which averages about 50 gallons per day all the year. This Farm, its buildings and stock are watered from wells, the water being forced for the different uses by windmill power, a gasoline engine and by a pressure tank. Water is thus furnished to nearly every building. Red Creek passing through the Farm furnishes water for fields and stock. Its name is derived from the Scotch, meaning Langshaw in English. Building improvements embrace the following: One large up-to-date cattle barn, 40x50, with cement floor and sanitary improvements; one horse barn 50x20, with same conveniences; also one stock barn 40x30 for young stock, with cement basement; one silo 14x30, a milk house 10x12 and carriage barn 30x15. The Farm's surface is level, the upper portion a clay gravel and lower part black muck. Its stock department embraces 35 head of graded cattle and one registered Holstein bull.

MANCHESTER HOMESTEAD. This Farm is owned by CHARLES O. MANCHESTER, Post Office Perry, Ohio, one and one-half miles distant. It contains 110.20 acres in Township 11, Range 7, Perry Township. Grapes,

24 acres, mostly Concord and Niagaras, four acres in other varieties of fruit, general farm products consisting of oats, wheat, corn, etc., constitute the Farm's industries. The fields, stockyards and buildings are watered by brooks and wells, the water being forced to buildings by windmill power. The building improvements are in fine condition. There are two substantial residences besides a tenant house and stock barn 36x40, horse and carriage barn 24x60, storage barn 36x60, pig sty 40x30, and several small buildings for sheep, poultry, etc. The Farm's surface is level, its soil composed of gravel, sand and loam. Eli Graves was a former owner, he selling to Marcus Winchester; Winchester to Orsemus Manchester; thence to Elmer Manchester and from the last named to Charles O. Manchester by will and purchase. The owner was born on the Manchester Homestead, and his life thus far has been devoted to farming pursuits, and he is responsible for the present high rating of the Farm. He was married November 11, 1896, to Miss Ella Hurlbert of Perry.

MAPLE LAWN is owned by HEALEY M. MANCHESTER, Address Perry, Ohio, R. F. D., No. 2. It contains 76 acres, and is located on South Ridge Road, three miles from Perry, its principal market. Dairying is the principal industry of this Farm and it is composed of graded cows. The daily milk product averages 45 gallons, which is shipped to the City of Cleveland. The soil products embrace corn, oats, wheat, potatoes, alfalfa, timothy and clover, in all about sixty acres. Its water supply is received from wells and a brooklet. Its name is derived from a row of maples facing the residence. Its buildings are all up-to-date, the stock barn for cattle and hay being one of the most complete in this section and contains cement floors and sanitary conveniences. Water is forced into the barn for use of stock by windmill pressure. The buildings are located on an elevation, but the general surface of the Farm is level and its soil composed of sand, gravel and clay, portions being black muck. Mr. Manchester has resided on this Farm over 71 years, his grandfather being the former owner. He married Nettie Cunningham, February 22, 1870, and they have one daughter, now Mrs. Eva May Adams.

NORTH SIDE FARM is owned by EUGENE J. NORTON, address Perry, O. It contains 41 acres located on South Ridge Road, Perry Village being its nearest market. The prominent feature of this Farm is its dairy of 45 head. The average daily milk product is about 50 gallons. Soil products embrace corn, oats, hay, etc. Stock is mostly high grade Shorthorns. An abundant water supply is received from wells and never-failing springs. Building improvements are in the best of repair and include a residence, stock barn 42x64, with cement floors and sanitary in all its features. The residence faces south, commanding a pleasing view of the country. The soil of this Farm is a black gravel and clay loam. Mr. Norton purchased this Farm in 1890, making most of the improvements. He married Emma L. Graves, February 26, 1874, and their family consists of two children, both living.

CHERRY FARM is owned by PETER H. PETERSON, Post Office Perry, Ohio, three miles distant. It contains 26.23 acres in Perry, and 36.90 acres in Madison Township. The location is on Middle Ridge Road, Perry being its nearest market. The name is derived from a grove of cherry trees on the place. Dairying and fruit are the principal industries. The dairy contains 15 head of registered Guernsey's, and the daily product is 37 gallons of milk and five gallons of pure cream. The water supply is obtained from wells, pumped by a gasoline engine and the supply is bountiful. The building improvements are modern in all respects, barns being furnished with cement floors and maintained at all times in a sanitary condition. A natural gas well is located on the Farm and the residence and other buildings are lighted by this natural gas. The Farm's surface is level and the soil a clay and gravelly loam. Mr. Peterson purchased a part of this Farm from George Hanshaw in 1890, the remaining portion being purchased at a later date. He is one of the progressive farmers of this section and his Farm is in the front rank of the many good farms of this County. Mr. Peterson married Mary Peterson, March 21, 1883, and their family consisted of 13 children, 10 of whom are living.

BIG SPRING DAIRY FARM is owned by HERMAN A. REED, Post Office, Perry, Ohio, R. F. D., No. 2, one and one-fourth miles distant and contains 103.05 acres. Its location is on the South Ridge Road. The special feature of the Farm's resources is its dairy which embraces 14 head of high grade Guernsey's, the average daily product being 15 gallons of milk and four gallons of cream. Soil products are general in character. Its water supply is received from wells and springs, one of the springs and the dairy are responsible for the Farm's name. All buildings are in excellent condition, the residence containing eight rooms. The barn is supplied with cement flooring, the principal barn being 80x40, dairy house supplied with spring water and all sanitary improvements. The Farm's surface is level, except somewhat undulating in certain portions and its soil is mostly a clay loam. This Farm came into the possession of the present owner by will from William Reed, his father. Herman A. Reed was born in Perry Township August 15, 1858, and has resided on his present Farm for 35 years. He was married to Addie Keener, January 18, 1882, and their family consists of two children, now living. Mr. Reed has been active in all matters pertaining to the best interest of his town and county.

ARBOR VITAE. This Farm is owned by F. I. STEVENSON, Post Office Address, Perry, Ohio, two and one-half miles distant. It contains 95 acres, located on the Middle Ridge Road, Township 11, Range 7. Dairying, general soil products and fruit culture comprise the Farm's chief revenues. The dairy comprises 21 head of Holsteins and 30 gallons of milk is the daily product.

Never-failing wells and a creek furnish an ample water supply. The Farm buildings are in the best of condition. The residence contains nine rooms and the stock barn, which is modern in every respect, is supplied with cement flooring. It is considered one of the fine barns of Lake County. In addition, there is a milk house 40x60 and horse barn. The Farm's surface is generally level. This was the property of William Stevenson, father of the present owner, who settled here in 1864. The father of the present owner who settled here in 1864, and at his death the title passed to his son in 1884. Mr. Stevenson married Josephine Rose, March 17, 1869, and their family consists of five children.

GRAND VIEW FARM is owned by G. WALTER SHUMWAY, Post Office Address, Painesville, Ohio, R. F. D., No. 5. Its location is South Ridge Road, corner of Lane Road, one and one-quarter miles from Lane Station, Stop 7, of the Electric Railway. Soil products are general in character, but Mr. Shumway is a breeder of thoroughbred Jersey stock, all registered, and including on an average 30 head. The dairy product averages about seven and one-half gallons of cream per day. The water supply is obtained from wells and springs by windmill power. Its name is derived from location, the view from the farm buildings being extremely picturesque. Building improvements are of a high class including cement floors in cattle barn, a vitrified block silo, smoke house, poultry house, dairy house and a modern farm residence of 12 rooms. The Farm's surface is mostly level with southern exposure, commanding a fine view of the surrounding country. The owner of this Farm is considered one of the practical and successful farmers of the County.

DELIGHTFUL VIEW is the name given THOS. E. STINCHCOMB'S farm, so named from the picturesque view from its buildings. Its location is on the North Ridge Road, two and one-half miles from Perry. This Farm is devoted to dairying, fruit culture and soil products common to this section. Its dairy products average 30 gallons per day. The dairy is composed of graded Holsteins and Durhams. The fruit department includes peaches, apples and small fruit. Its water supply is received from wells by windmill power. Its buildings include an up-to-date residence with all modern conveniences, with barns and out buildings necessary for a first-class farm. Its soil is a black muck and sandy loam, which of course is exceedingly productive. The surface of the Farm is level, but gives a commanding view of the Lake, being located about three-fourths of a mile distant. Mr. Stinchcomb purchased the Farm in 1892, and has made most valuable improvements, which have added largely to the Farm's value. He and his family have resided on this Farm since its purchase in 1892.

FRIENDLY STOCK FARM is owned by JOHN L. SHEPARD, address Perry, Ohio, R. F. D., No. 2. It contains 52.09 acres on the Fairport Road, Stop No. 10, of the C. P. & A. R. R. The products are shipped by the trolley from Stop 10 on this Farm. Dairying, fruit, poultry and general soil products constitute the Farm's industries. The special feature is its dairy containing 25 head of graded and thoroughbred cows, the product from which is 25 gallons of milk per day. The water supply is received from springs and wells. Building improvements are in the best condition and electric lighted. The residence has all modern conveniences. The soil is a gravelly loam and exceedingly productive, as is evidenced by the extraordinary yield of 100 bushels of oats per acre and four tons of alfalfa to the acre is not unusual. Friendly Stock Farm was purchased by the present owner in 1891, and he has added many important improvements. It is considered one of the noted Farms of Perry Township.

BALLYRUE is the name given the Farm of B. SEGNER, and G. S. JAMES, their address being Perry Village, two and one-half miles distant. It contains 7.72 acres located on the North Ridge Road, two and one-half miles from Perry Village. This little Farm is devoted almost exclusively to the cultivation of fruit, and is watered by never-failing wells. Its building improvements consist of a comfortable residence. Its surface is level and its soil a gravel and muck. George S. James was born in Cleveland, O., January 27, 1890, and came to Perry, March, 1914. In January, 1915, he opened a general store at the corner of North Ridge and Antiarth Roads, conducting a successful business from the day the store was opened and Mr. James is considered a popular young merchant. The business conducted has so developed that an enlargement to his salesrooms has been necessary from time to time. He married Mary McNeal, May 19, 1911. The store is located on an improved highway noted for automobile traffic.

BIRCH LAWN FARM is owned by Jno. H. STONE, Post Office, Perry, O. It contains 74 acres on the Middle Ridge Road two and one-half miles from Perry Village in Lots 72 and 82, Township 11, Range 7. Perry Village is its nearest market. The earning capacity of this Farm is divided as follows. One and one-half acres in grapes, two acres in pears, four acres of apples, five acres of peaches and several varieties of berries. Its soil products are onions, potatoes, corn, oats, wheat, etc. In addition, there are 12 acres in meadow and seven in timber. The Farm is watered by wells, a Township Ditch and a never-failing spring. Building improvements embrace a commodious farm residence, modern and up-to-date in its appointments, containing 14 rooms, large barn for stock in excellent condition, with cement floor and in dimensions 30x60, tool house, ice house, corn house and carriage house combined, one garage, one silo and poultry house. The Farm's surface is level, its soil a gravel loam with some black sand. In addition to the Farm's products already mentioned, Mr. Stone has a small herd of Holstein cattle. This Farm was first owned by Isaac Sawdey; from him to E. C. Sawdey, thence to Elsie D. Sawdey, from whom the Farm was purchased by the present owner in 1906. Mr. Stone married Eva M. Lace, September 25, 1895, and their family consists of four children, three daughters and one son, the latter residing in Cleveland.
