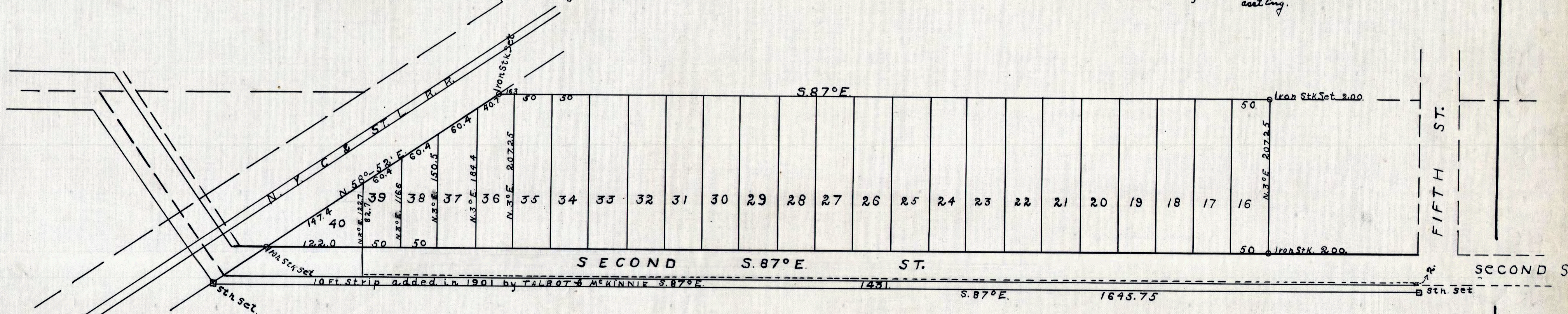

Dickey by deed dated Mar 4, 1899 a recorded in Lake County Records of Deeds, Vol. 29, Page 265, and is bounded and described as shown on the annexed plat. The bearings and distances are given on their respective lines. The bearings are given to an assumed meridian and correctly indicate the angles. Distances are given in feet and decimals. Iron stakes were set at points marked thus "Iron Stake set" on the plat. The lot numbers are given in figures near the centers of the respective lots, and run from 16 to 41 inclusive. Second Street is an extension of an existing St.
